Boro Court Reports

Magistrate Jacob R. Bauer Wednesday, December 26, in Mountainside Police Court ordered the driver's license of Joseph Alicato, 18, of 72 Concord Avenue, Maplewood, charged with speeding, revoked for 60 days and levied a fine of \$20 against him.

The youth was accused of driving 70-miles-an-hour in a 45-mile-an-hour zone. He was apprehended December 10 in Route 22 by Sergeant E. Dobson of the Union County Park Police. A fine of \$18 was levied against Bobby Owens of 511 Plainfield Avenue, Plainfield, charged with careless driving. Owens was given a summons after he was involved in an accident December 1 while traveling west in Route 22.

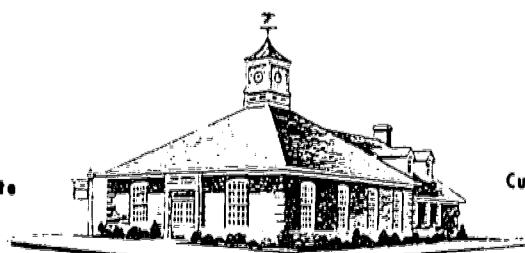
