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Magistrate Bauer Lifts License

Charged with speeding, Robert D. Simpson of 38 Clark Street, Bloomfield was fined \$15 and his driver's license revoked for 30 days when he appeared before Magistrate Jacob R. Bauer January 15 at Mountainside Police Court. Simpson was accused of traveling 60 miles-an-hour in a 45 mile-an-hour zone. He was apprehended January 22 while traveling east on Route 22.

Dog Owners Regulations

In cooperation with the Scotch Plains dog licensing campaign underway during the month of January, the following is a list of some Scotch Plains regulations regarding dogs. The ordinance from which this information is taken is Ordinance #15:

1. No person shall keep or harbor any dog within the Township of Scotch Plains without first obtaining a license therefor, to be issued by the Clerk of the Township upon application by the owner and payment of the prescribed fee. Licenses are due during the month of January or when a dog is six months old.
2. No person shall keep, harbor or maintain any dog which habitually barks or cries between the hours of ten (10) P.M. and six (6) A.M.
3. No person owning, keeping, or harboring any dog shall suffer or permit it to run at large upon the public streets or in any public park, or in any other public place within the Township of Scotch Plains in the County of Union.
4. No person owning, keeping or harboring any dog shall suffer or permit it to be upon the public streets or in any of the public places of the Township of Scotch Plains unless such dog is accompanied by a person over the age of twelve (12) years and is securely confined and controlled by an adequate leash not more than six (6) feet long.
5. No person owning, keeping or harboring a dog shall permit or suffer it to do any injury, or to do any damage to any lawn, shrubbery, flowers, grounds or property.

Any person who violates or refuses to comply with any part of the foregoing regulations, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days, or to both, in the discretion of the court.

The public is cordially invited to attend the 4th annual Science Fair to be held at the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Junior High School on Park Avenue, Scotch Plains. The fair will be open to the public on Friday, January 25, from 7:00 - 11:00 P.M. and on Saturday, January 26, from 9:00 - 2:00 p.m.

Over 1,000 student constructed projects will be displayed. The projects represent a portion of the research work required of the students during the school year. There will also be continuous motion pictures shown in the various areas of science.

The fair has been organized by the Junior High School Science Department. Seven judges, all of whom are involved in scientific work, will be on hand to judge the projects.

Prizes will be awarded on Friday night for each grade level. Major categories to be judged will include: Biology, Chemistry, Physics and General Science. A prize will also be awarded to the overall winner of the fair.

Each project will be evaluated based on the following criteria: creative ability, scientific thought, thoroughness, technical skill, clarity and knowledge of material. Winners will be sent to the Newark Science Fair held at Newark College of Engineering.

Mental Health Ass'n To Meet

The Eighteenth Annual meeting of the Union County Association for Mental Health to be held on January 28, 1963, at the Mountainside Inn, Mountainside, will feature the premiere showing of an important and exciting new film about the treatment of mental illness and a major address by Dr. William E. Ganss, Medical Director of the Union County Psychiatric Clinic, on community aspects of mental illness, it was announced today by James K. Baugher, President of the Association.

This meeting will also be a tribute to Mr. Baugher who is finishing his third term in office and who has devoted many years in the service of the mentally ill of Union County. Mr. Baugher is the Principal of Grace Wilday and Washington Schools, both in Roselle. The Nominating Committee will present its slate for the election of officers and members of the Board of Directors.

The focus of this Annual Meeting will be on the challenge which the seriousness of the problem of mental illness presents to the public. All of the agencies in Union County concerned with the care of the mentally ill have been invited to participate in this program and there will be an opportunity to discuss the many facets of this problem. In addition to this, there will be displays of materials dealing with the rehabilitation of the mentally ill.

The Folk Festival Council of New York has been working with the MMA committee in an effort to bring to Mountainside the most authentic and interesting of these ethnic groups.

In connection with the Festival, there will be a display of folk arts and crafts, native costumes, weapons, jewelry, religious articles, historical artifacts, etc. Mrs. Clarence Winans has accepted the chairmanship of the Folk Museum. 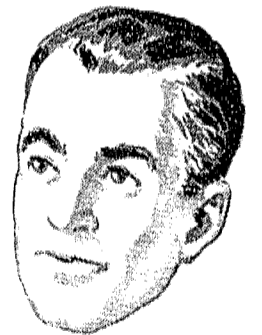
