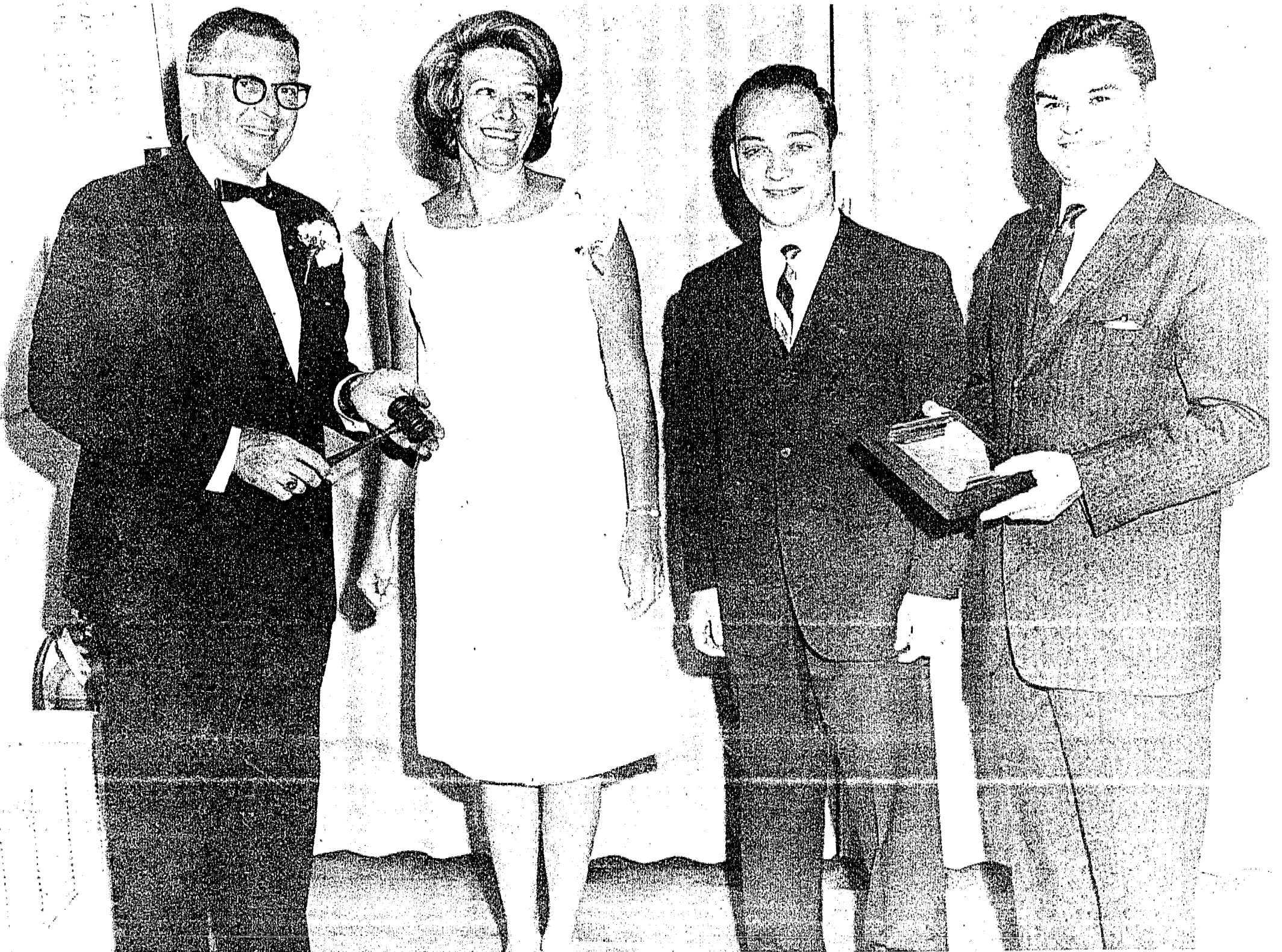

## Three Local Teachers Selected To Participate In NDEA Program

Edward Warshow, an English teacher at Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School, is one of thirty secondary school teachers chosen to attend the new English summer program at Rutgers University sponsored by the National Defense Education Act.

The program under the direction of Dr. Thomas R. Edwards Jr., Associate Professor of English at Rutgers University, will explore contemporary approaches to literary criticism, linguistic study, and composition.

The instructors will be professors from Rutgers and the course will start July 5 and end August 5. The course is equal to six credits on the graduate level and Warshow will use the credits toward his Doctorate at Rutgers. Warshow also received an offer to attend a similar program at Boston University.

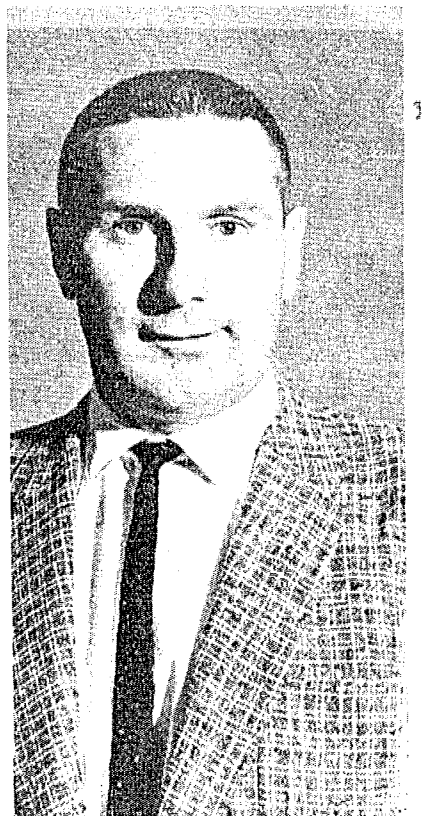

Plains Fanwood High School, have been selected to participate in a new summer program on American history sponsored by the National Defense Education Act. The program will present new approaches to teaching, new interpretations, and new applications toward understanding history. The courses, which are equal to six credits on the graduate level, will begin July 5, and end August 13.

Jensen was one of forty out of 800 applicants accepted for the early American history course which will be held at Princeton University. It will be run on a seminar basis with guest professors and extensive outside reading.

Koch, chosen similarly, will attend the course entitled "Problems in Recent American History" at Rutgers University. Under the direction of Dr. Richard M. Brown, Associate Professor of History in the College of Arts and Science and the Graduate School, Rutgers, the seminar will concentrate on the rise of industrialism and isolationism.
