Open House At The Rabies Clinic

If ever anyone out there in our reading audience should think that parents are proud of their offspring, he or she should hurry on over to the annual rabies clinic at the Fanwood Borough Garage to find out what parental pride is REALLY all about. Dog and cat owners bring their darlings to get their shot of the year from Dr. William Klein . . . and many of the darlings just don't like it one bit. Life can get a bit hectic as Pete and Kelly, Sparky and Pepper, Emily and Andre come 'on down to the old town hall for a hot time at the old rabies clinic.

Last Tuesday night was the finale for the year in Fanwood, where approximately 470 pets were inoculated in three weekly sessions. Scotch Plains three nights of clinics resulted in 1,005 vaccinated pets. Both series are sponsored by the Board of Health. The variety and the behavior? You simply wouldn't believe it. A very Republican cat who is 14 years old and goes by the name of Fluffy Coulter (daddy is a Councilman) came for her shot, all wrapped up in a white blanket. 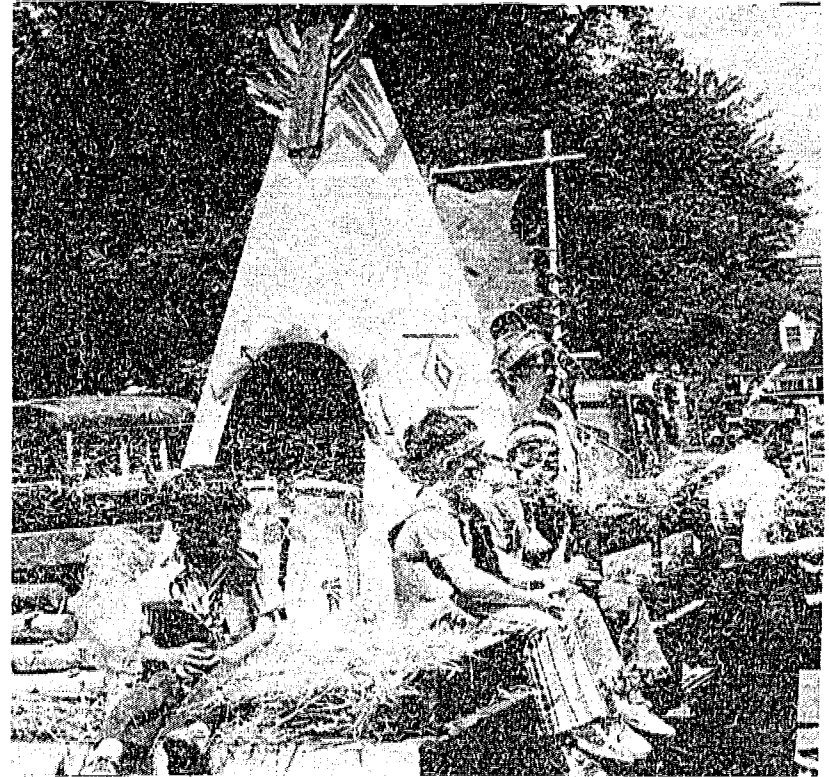

Towns Turn Out For Memorial Day Parade

Floats, Bands, Kids And Good Weather Combine For A Memorable Holiday

Parade Day 1972 brought with it not only stirring march music, flags, and colorful costumes but also some of the nicest weather to be enjoyed by Scotch Plains-Fanwood residents in quite a while. Under the sponsorship of the American Legion, the 1972 Memorial Day parade stepped out at 1:30 p.m. on Sunday from the Fanwood Memorial Library and ended at the cannon in Scotch Plains. Wreaths were placed on the flagpoles at either end of the march by the Legion and other local groups in honor of deceased veterans of United States wars.

The parade featured all the customary favorites, plus one or two new additions to the line of march. The Legion color guard was first in line, followed by one of the newcomers -- DARE, the local drug abuse rehabilitation outreach center. Their car bore a sign, "DARE CARES - Come On Down."

Local officials from both governments were snappy riding in several of the more than 30 antique automobiles. The line-

up included old Fords, Chevys, Plymouths, LaSalles, and Pontiacs -- each one in perfect condition. One of the audience lining the sidewalks was heard to question why antique cars can operate at snail's pace along the parade route without stalling when a car of 1972 vintage would probably stall every ten feet.

Site Demolition Begins For Car Care Center

Maple Tree Inn, a Fanwood landmark for many years, has been leveled within the past week and site clearance has begun for construction of a car care center on Terrill Road. A building permit which would permit construction of the center by Humble Oil Company was issued by the Borough of Fanwood in April. A variance was granted by the Fanwood Board of Adjustment last year.

As planned, the car care center will be located on level ground on Terrill Road between South and LaGrande Avenues, on a commercially zoned lot. The construction necessitates bulldozing and elimination of the present hilly crest upon which the former restaurant was located. A retaining wall is contemplated at the rear of the Humble property to separate the Humble operation from businesses located behind it on South Avenue and residences behind it on LaGrande Avenue.

The center will include a service station on the portion of the

property near the intersection of South Avenue, with the car center to be located in the middle of the block. The service station will include twelve pumps.

The repair facility will have ten bays, providing for repairs on ten cars at one time. Humble plans a storeroom with the latest. Originally, the oil company had contemplated including a car wash with the service station and repair facility, but withdrew their request for that portion of the total facility. The car wash would have required
