THE SQUAD REPORTS

During the month of March, the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad responded to 98 emergency calls. They included 7 cardiacs, 2 fire alarms, 7 home accidents, 32 home illnesses, 2 maternities, 8 public accidents, 7 public illnesses, 10 road accidents, 19 transportations, 1 standby and 3 miscellaneous calls.

The squad spent over 280 man hours in service to the township.

In the first quarter of 1982 the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad has responded to 267 emergency calls and have spent over 800 hours of service to the township.

FANWOOD DOGS QUEUE UP FOR RABIES SHOTS

The Fanwood Board of Health will sponsor its Annual Clinic for the inoculation of dogs against rabies. There will be two sessions. The first on Monday, May 10th, and the second on May 17th. Both Clinics will be held from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Borough Garage on North Avenue.

All dogs must be on a leash held by a person strong enough to restrain the animals. No cats will be inoculated. There is no charge and the service is restricted to owners of animals who reside in Fanwood.

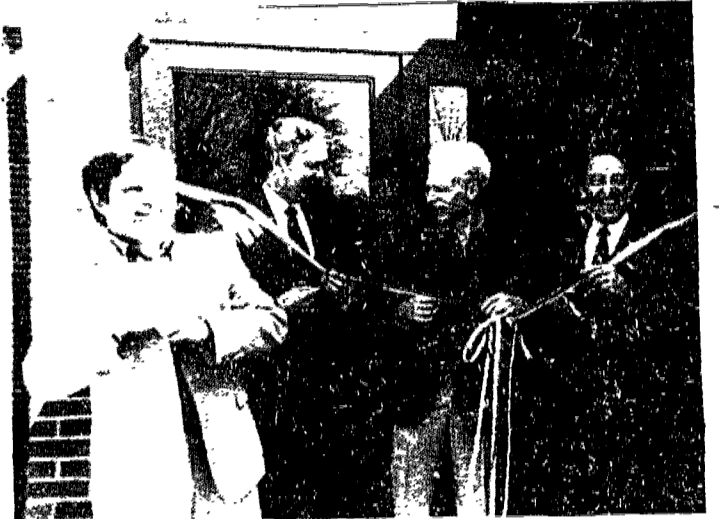
Approximately 100 community residents, contributors and Y officials toured the new areas and enjoyed a wine and cheese reception after the opening ceremonies.

Bd. of Adjustment meets to discuss dumpster

The Scotch Plains Board of Adjustment met April 22nd to once more review an application for a dumpster that's been a source of concern to the Board and the Town Council since last September. Andrusky Contractors requested permission to keep a dumpster for storage of grass clippings and shrubs at the 2390 Lindsey Avenue business. The site, which is zoned M1, for light industry is used as a transfer station where construction and landscaping materials are retained until they can be moved to another location.

Board attorney Anthony Rinaldo noted that although Mr. Andrusky's application had been approved by the Board last year in September, it was reversed by the Township Council because there was "insufficient evidence to grant the variance." At that time, the Council stated there were no special reasons, and a failure to show that the proposed use would not be detrimental to the public good. Their decision followed the submission of petitions from residents asking for reconsideration. (Homeowners complained of the bad odors, rats, containers of propane and large
