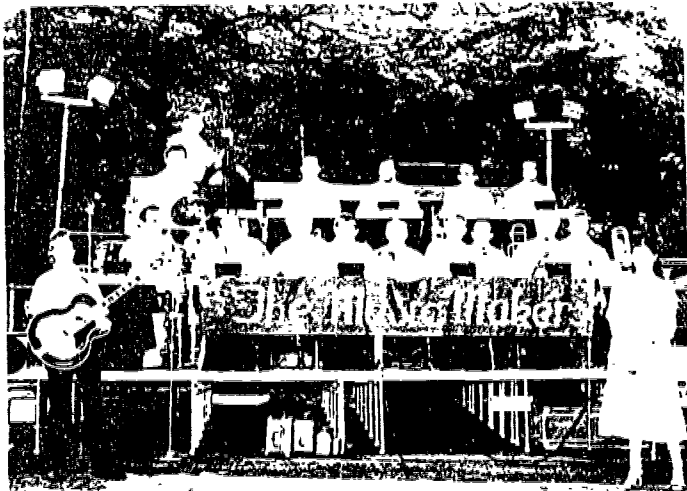

Borough approves curbing and downtown developer

Approximately 75 people crowded the tiny multipurpose room at Fanwood's municipal complex Wednesday, July 14 for the regular meeting of the borough council.

The audience was made up of Fanwood merchants interested in the Downtown Redevelopment Committee's selection of a developer and of South Martine Avenue home owners opposed to being assessed for the installation of Belgian block curbing along their property lines.

The council unanimously approved the Moorehouse Corporation to develop the square block bounded by Martine, LaGrande, Second and South Avenue. Representatives of the chosen corporation, John Verb and Charles Dodge, answered questions from the merchants and residents. Verb told the group that the aim of Moorehouse was to "(1) produce a design that was economically viable, (2) layout a design that was

aesthetically pleasing and (3) a design that was functional within itself."

Verb further commented that "At this point this is a concept plan. We've not met with the Planning Board. Mr. DeVito (Carmin DeVito, borough engineer) has not reviewed it...nor has the Downtown Redevelopment Committee. We are seeking to unify the project with the rest of Fanwood's downtown community."

Many of the merchants on Martine Avenue were unduly alarmed because of erroneous information given by a local daily newspaper which reported that only five of the stores on that block would remain...all others would be relocated.

Joe Kulik, proprietor of the Fanwood Corner Store, thanked Councilman Doug Clausen and Bob McCarthy, a member of the Downtown Redevelopment Committee, for taking the time to come over and allay the fears of the Martine Ave. merchants.

Kulik then read the results

of a survey taken by the merchants from 500 shoppers in downtown Fanwood. The results showed the shoppers wanted additional parking space, and many thought the lighting not adequate. Others thought the area needed "cleaning up and fixing up" and a few wanted Fanwood "left the way it is".

Of those who wanted to see additional stores in the area, the majority would like to see

a "variety-type store, a shoe store and a shoe repair shop".

Many of the homeowners affected by the Belgian block controversy were concerned that those on fixed incomes such as retired residents, would not be able to pay the assessment if the rumored cost would be \$13 per running foot.

Boryea named basketball coach at Somerset College

Jay Boryea of Fanwood, is the new men's basketball coach at Somerset County College for the 1982-83 academic year.

In 1980-81 with a record of 6-3. He is the son of Mrs. Elaine Boryea and the late Jerome Boryea, former councilman of the borough of Fanwood.

A 1973 graduate of Susquehanna University in Selingsgrove, PA. where he played varsity basketball, Boryea was awarded the "Mr. Basketball" award in 1973.

Following graduation, in 1973-74, he was Graduate Assistant at Susquehanna; in 1976-78, he was the junior varsity basketball coach at Union Catholic High School, where he set a record for the school with wins 15-8; 1978-82, assistant coach, Farleigh Dickinson University, Madison, New Jersey, where he was in charge of scouting and recruiting, and where he coached sub-varsity

Boryea noted, "In terms of goals for the coming year, I intend to work closely with local high schools. A number of very good players are coming out of these schools who could do very well for their career playing at Somerset. Here they can polish their skills before transferring to a four-year program. The fact that Somerset has such a good reputation should certainly help me in my efforts to interest local athletes."

Practice sessions for the 1982-83 season begin October 1, 1982.

The team will return to the United States on Friday, July 23. Landing at Kennedy International is scheduled for 6:30 pm with estimated arrival time in Scotch Plains at 9:00 pm, the U.S. Customs Service willing.

The success of this soccer exchange is already planting seeds for the future. The Scotch Plains-Fanwood Soccer Association hopes to host a team from Sweden for May, 1983, as part of the next Westfield Cup competition.

Kay Davitt, Chairperson of the Scotch Plains Merchants Association is expecting approximately 50 merchants to be involved this year and said, "I hope the weather will cooperate all three days. This way the shoppers will have the maximum opportunity to take advantage of the wonderful values and personal service being offered by the participating merchants."

Soccer exchange trip tremendous success

The teenagers from the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Soccer Association traveling in Scandinavia have completed the rigors of their tournament and have achieved some modest successes. In this first-ever international travel for the local Association, progress comes in small and richly satisfying steps. The team and coaches have greatly enjoyed the hospitality of their Swedish hosts and the skill of the tournament organizers from "Friendship Ambassadors".

The week of July 12 had four games to wrap up the

formal tournament. The Scotch Plains-Fanwood team suffered losses to Malmo 4-1 and Bjaerred 7-4. Both teams are from Sweden. Paul Tavaglione earned the first goal of the tournament for Scotch Plains-Fanwood. In the Bjaerred match, Bill Kraus scored two and Len Garrison and Keith Young scored one each. A special round robin tournament in Copenhagen, Denmark, ended the competition. Scotch Plains-Fanwood scored a 1-1 record with a 2-0 win over Dover, New Jersey, and a 4-0 loss to Mays Landing, New

Jersey. Goal scorers were Tavaglione and Garrison.

The final week of the Scandinavian trip will center on cultural exchange. The team has traveled through Sweden, attended a pro soccer game in Malmo and an amusement park in Gotenborg. A gala banquet for 300 athletes and coaches was held in Copenhagen. The Scotch Plains-Fanwood Soccer Association will entertain their Swedish hosts in a special going-away party.
