Approval still pending for JACY temporary use permit

The Scotch Plains Board of Adjustment held another heated meeting last Monday night as they sat in special session to hear witnesses testify in the continuing saga of the Jewish Association of Centers and Y's (JACY) application for a temporary use permit.

The Board's approval must be forthcoming before September 1, 1982 in order for the group to officially open the Shackamaxon facilities for their pre-school and senior citizen programs.

John Madden, planning expert for JACY, was questioned by Irvine Johnstone, attorney for Taxpayers Opposed to the Sale of Shackamaxon (TOSS), as to the intended use of the school. Madden explained that, as he understood it, the facility would be used for "pre-schoolers, children of all ages, cultural activities for families, speakers and organizations raising funds".

Johnstone further questioned Madden regarding the number of nights/days activities would be held at Shack (six or seven) and the number of people in the building (multi-purpose room) at one time for "dances" (around 200).

JACY attorney Daniel Bernstein repeatedly asked the Board and Johnstone to limit the questioning of the witnesses to the temporary use permit issue. The TOSS attorney replied that the temporary use permit would have a great deal of effect on the permanent use variance.

Another witness, Penny Margolies, executive director of the Jewish Community Center (JCC), told the Board that she is no longer the executive director of JACY, but merely a member of the JACY board. As an expert witness, Mrs. Margolies outlined the need for the Shackamaxon facility. Some JACY board. As an expert

What makes Larry run... all the way to stardom

Larry Stuart wasn't always in show business. Even though he knew that he would be eventually, ever since he entertained his class at Terrill Junior School and then later on in Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School where he graduated in 1971.

And despite his famous father, baritone Enzo Stuarti, Larry remained pretty much in the background, earning his own way with an assortment of jobs that included caddying for Shackamaxon Country club, washing cars at Towne Car Wash and sweeping up the kitchen at Alfonso's Pizzeria. Not exactly jobs designed to further one's career in show biz, but ones that could give an energetic young boy the independence and confidence he needed on his way to becoming a man.

At age 28, Larry Stuart is getting it all together. He's partially satisfied the urge to create by cutting his first record "All I Need is Your Love" (a song he wrote) with a West Side Story medley on the flip side. The 45 single was issued under the SALE

label (a combination of Larry, Stuart, Andrea, his sister, and Esther, his mother), and will be available

Larry is often billed as "dynamic", probably stemming from the fact that he is the personification of perpetual motion. Larry has made TV commercials (G.T.E. Flip-Phone, Dentyne and a Saving Energy slot for P.B.S.), and presented his cabaret singing-acting-dancing act with Phyllis Diller at Caesar's Boardwalk Regency in Atlantic City, plus appearances at the Garden State Arts Center and countless clubs and showcases in between.

His crash concentrated courses in dancing and acting are the requisite dues and credentials, because Larry Stuart doesn't need them...he is a natural. If he never set foot inside an acting class, he has it...it's just there. And the magnetism is genuine and

real, just like his love for Scotch Plains. Except for the years he spent at Cornell getting his degree in hotel and restaurant management, Larry has never left home for any great length of time.

That's why Larry is excited about the concert he's doing for the Cultural Arts Committee here in Scotch Plains next Thursday for the "Music on the Village Green" series. His numbers will be a mixed bag...some nostalgia, some rock, some Broadway hits and some contemporary. He'll be accompanied this trip out by the Chris Warren Trio (you know them from the Jade Isle Restaurant appearances).

Don't miss Larry Stuart in the final concert on the Village Green...it's going to be a real winner. And then you'll be able to say-later- "I saw him when..."
