## Delphi Team and students prepare for Leadership Conf.

During the summer months, members of the communities' Delphi Team and the Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School Student Government Association have been finalizing plans for this year's Student Leadership Conference. It is hoped that this year's conference, which will take place on September 10, 11 and 12 at the Greenkill YMCA Camp, will be at least as successful as last year's initial effort. Some 50 students, five teachers and six members of the Delphi Team will leave for Camp Greenkill on Friday afternoon, September 10th.

Last year's conference which was designed and led by the Delphi Team consisting of Dr. Robert Howlett, superintendent of Schools; Mrs. Leonia Reilly, president of the Board of Education; Mrs. Mary Alice Pugh, past president of the PTA Council; Captain Robert Luce and Detective Carl Sicola of the Scotch Plains Police Department. The team provided a very challenging and meaningful

experience for some 47 students who returned to the high school with a variety of projects to be implemented over the year. One of the projects, the erection of a permanent community bulletin board on a brick foundation dedicated to the veterans of the Vietnamese war, should reach fruition during the fall.

To date, funding for this year's conference has been received from the Fanwood-Scotch Plains Rotary, the Service Club, UNICO, Scotch Plains Lions Club, Student Government Associations of Terrill and Park Schools, the High School PTA, Fanwood Lions Club, the Scotch Plains PBA, the Senior Class of 1982, Blue Raiders Booster Club and Mr. Thomas's team of the 1981 Student Leadership Conference. ## Arthur Meyer, Sr. receives national service award

Arthur Meyer, Sr., a foreman in the Public Works Department of the Township of Scotch Plains, has been notified that he is one of the recipients of the Samuel A. Greeley Local Government Service Award.

This year the award has been given to 51 local public works officials from across the United States and Canada. To be eligible, a public works administrator must serve a local government agency "honorably and efficiently" for at least 30 years, and Art observed his 34th anniversary with the township D.P.W. in 1982.

He was recommended for the award by Ray D'Amato, Director of Public Works for Scotch Plains.

Art's office walls are filled with numerous awards and citations, notably the Edward Decher Service Award in 1980. He has been a member of the New York-New Jersey Metro Chapter of the American Public Works Association for 25 years. In his present capacity, Art takes care of the majority of complaints in a trouble-shooting fashion.

A life-long resident of Scotch Plains, he is also a captain of the Northside Fire Department, and has been a member of that organization for 34 years.

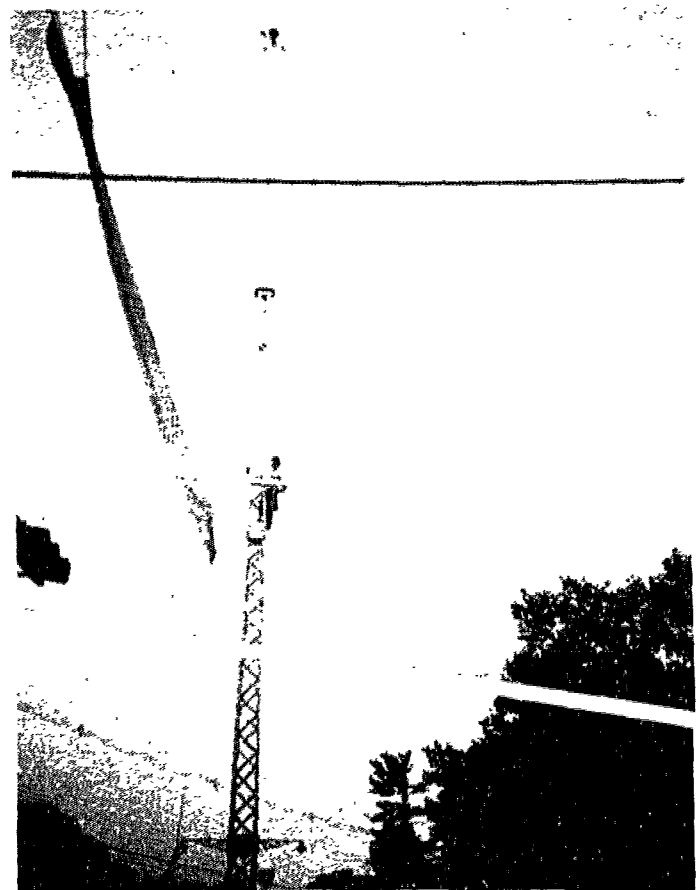
Art served with the U.S. Army in the Field Artillery in World War II and lives with his wife, Dorothy, in Scotch Plains where the Meyers raised five children.
