Truck traffic to be rerouted from Terrill Road bridge

In a letter to Borough Clerk Dan Mason, Armand Fiorletti, Director of Union County Dept. of Engineering & Planning, advised the Fanwood governing body that construction on the Terrill Road bridge was scheduled to begin in the fall of 1984.

Fiorletti outlined the detour route that would take truck traffic away from the bridge as soon as directional signs are installed. From Route 22, traffic going southbound on Terrill Road

will turn right at East Second Street, turn left on Leland Avenue and left on South Avenue, turning right at Terrill Road.

Northbound traffic will turn right (east) on South Avenue, left (north) on Martine Ave., turning left (west) on Midway Avenue and right (north) on Terrill Road. According to Police Chief Anthony Parenti the detour plan will be put into effect as soon as the Plainfield Council agrees to the route and the ap-

propriate signs are posted warning trucks 10 tons and over not to use the bridge.

In other business before the council Borough Administrator

Llewellyn Fisher told the Mayor and council that citizens who are eligible to receive

British Redcoats to descend on Scotch Plains Sunday

The 38th Regiment of Foot, dressed in their scarlet coats and white breeches, were especially conspicuous in the Scotch Plains-Westfield area during the Revolutionary War years, and they will be conspicuous again on Sunday, April 24 when members of the 20th century Regiment descend on the historic Osborn house located at 1840 Front Street in Scotch Plains.

Dennis L. Krowe, Commander of the unit, said that the 38th Regiment fought at the Battle of Short Hills in June 1777; the Battle of Spankton (Rahway) in 1776; the Battle of Springfield in 1780; and the battles of Lexington and Concord, Bunker Hill; New York, Philadelphia, Monmouth, Germantown and Long Island. In addition, they served as the occupation force at New Brunswick in 1776.

Today's 38th Regiment is a group of men and women who have recreated the earlier British Regiment down to the last buttonhole. Please turn to page 13

S.P. Budget hearing draws light turnout

Not only did winter come in April but there was more snow than people at Tuesday night's Town Council meeting for the final reading on Scotch Plains' 1983 Municipal Budget. Even council members were 15 minutes late to begin the proceedings and Mayor Lawrence Newcomb apologized by explaining that the state had "thrown a curve" to the budget.

an explanation of the proposed budget amendment from the Township Manager, Thomas Atkins. Atkins explained that Trenton reviews each town's budget for approval and had questioned Scotch Plains' \$36,000 of appropriation under the Sanitary Land Fill Closure Act Law of 1981. \$10,000 is a mandated cost by law which the state accepted and the remainder of \$26,000 will

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Mayor Ted Trumpp to retire from office

Fanwood Mayor Theodore F. Trumpp, 58, announced today he will retire from public office when his current term expires at the end of the year.

"I have decided not to seek re-election after having served 12 years as Mayor and nearly eight years as a Councilman," Trumpp said.

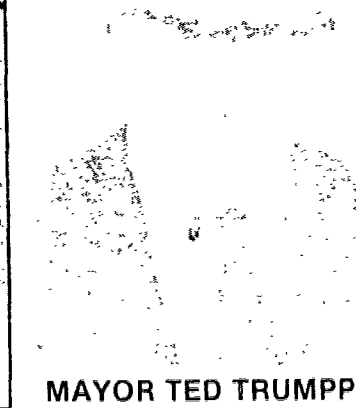
"I will not be a candidate in the primary election this year and, instead, will turn my full attention to my family for the first time in more than 20 years."

Trumpp was first elected to the Council in 1961 and served two years as Council President. He was elected to the first of his three terms as Mayor in 1971. He twice served two-year terms as President of the Republican Club and has been an Elder of the Fanwood Presbyterian Church since 1968.

He was a Charter Member of the Fanwood-Scotch Plains Jaycees.

He lives with his wife, Jean, at 28 Arlene Court. The Trumpps have three children, Please turn to page 14

Faulty fire extinguishers dangerous to your health

Scotch Plains Police Chief Robert Luce issued a warning to township residents about a dangerous fire extinguisher currently on the market that can result in the acceleration of a fire instead of extinguishing it.

The product is packaged in a six inch high white aerosol can with red lettering and carrying an eagle logo surrounded by "Federal Protection Service". The can stipulates that it is approved by the Coast Guard and Underwriters Laboratories, which, according to Luce, is false information. The product is manufactured by an Illinois company and is supposed to be used on oil, grease and paper fires. "The most Please turn to page 2
