Mayor Newcomb proclaims Oct. 8th Scotch Plains Day

To celebrate the unique cultural heritage of Scotch Plains, then Mayor Alan Augustine proclaimed the first Saturday in October as Scotch Plains Day in 1979 and this Saturday, the 5th annual Scotch Plains Day will be celebrated on the Village Green and at the Municipal Building on Park Ave.

At Tuesday night's council meeting, Scotch Plains Mayor Larry Newcomb proclaimed this Saturday, Oct. 8, as 1983 Scotch Plains Day.

Highlights of the celebration will include a 1-mile fun run (8:30 a.m.), a 5-mile run (9 a.m.), awards ceremony for the runners (10:30 a.m.), ceremonies honoring citizens for their contribution to the community and a band concert by the high school marching band will follow.

In addition, the Scotch Plains Lions will hold a flea market in the municipal parking lot and the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Arts Association will host an art show exhibition from 11 to 2 p.m.

Crop for Hunger marchers forge ahead despite wet & soggy afternoon



Approximately 150 marchers, armed with umbrellas and rain coats gathered at the Scotch Plains Baptist Church last Sunday for their annual Crop Hunger Walk for the benefit of hungry people locally and internationally.

Leading off the parade of marchers

were (left to right) Temple Israel spiritual leader Rabbi George Nudell, Rev. James Dewart, Ministerial Group president and pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Scotch Plains, Senator Donald DiFrancesco and Rev. Homer Tricules, pastor of the Scotch Plains Baptist Church.

Senator DiFrancesco told the crowd that he didn't have far to come as he was born across the street from the church.

After devotions, led by Rabbi Nudell and Pastor Tricules, the marchers donned their rain coats, hoisted their umbrellas, and bravely marched off in the rain.

Tire playground termed "blight" by Fan. resident

At the close of last Tuesday's Scotch Plains council meeting, Fanwood resident Jerome Cook assailed the governing body for not answering a complaint he registered last May with the council.

Cook is objecting to the tire playground at McGinn School which faces his home on Daniel Place. Although the school is in Scotch Plains, the playground is in Fanwood, and he termed the playground a "blight". Cook questioned why it was not in the province of Scotch Plains, and if the township ever issued a building permit. "I'm not going to have that thing dumped before my house...I pay my taxes and we pay the

school board but they can do what they like."

Mayor Larry Newcomb told Cook that the township does not have jurisdiction over the matter. "This item should go before the school board or the borough of Fanwood," Newcomb said.

Cook wanted to know why he had not received a letter regarding the council's decision on the matter and the Mayor said that assistant township attorney Michael Mitzner had advised them that the township zoning ordinance was not applicable, and that he assumed a letter had been sent to Cook.

Township attorney Donald DiFrancesco promised Cook that a
