Approximately 50 representatives from over 30 community organizations and service groups attended the kick-off meeting last Monday to plan Scotch Plains' 300th birthday celebration in 1984.

Chaired by Judy Terry, the Board of Trustees for the Tercentennial Committee, Norbert Bernstein, Bea Burns, William Elliott, Fred Webb, Gabe Spera and Dr. Carlo Pallini, outlined their specific responsibilities for the historic project.

The celebration is planned to encompass activities in three categories: Jubilation, Heritage and Horizons. Under Jubilation would come the actual happenings. The Heritage portion is concerned with the historical aspect of Scotch Plains and Horizons deals with "The Legacy We Have" and "What We Are Leaving for Future Generations".

Regularly scheduled township events such as Memorial Day Parade, 4th of July celebration (Scotch Plains is the host community for the Plain-

field parade next year), the Labor Day Italian Festival and the October Scotch Plains Day will be geared to the township's 300th birthday.

Chairman Terry hopes to involve every ethnic community in Scotch Plains as well as the various community organizations who will use the tercentennial theme in their annual projects.

It is a gigantic effort and the enthusiasm seems to be running high. And it will take an enthusiastic person to guide the talents and availabilities of the various group members. Judy Terry fills the bill very well. She is a longtime Scotch Plains resident and a history buff, with a burning desire to make the tercentennial a success.

It's just the beginning. She needs the help of everyone in town to volunteer ideas, services and to make Scotch Plains' 300th birthday a memorable one and to truly put Scotch Plains on the map. "Most of us won't be around for the 400th birthday," said Judy, "so we'd better do this one right."
