Students win 18 trophies at Festivals of Music in Canada

Over 300 students plus 31 directors, advisors and chaperones returned to Scotch Plains late Sunday night tired but proud to be bringing home 18 trophies for their accomplishments in representing their high school at the Festivals of Music in Toronto, Canada.

The Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School Music Department competed for three days with large AAA rated schools from Mass., Del., Michigan, Wisconsin, Pa., Virginia, N.J., N.Y. and Maryland. The Raider Marching Band received a 1st place trophy for their popular field show that concludes with the unrolling of a huge American flag as the band members form a flag enclosing it.

The Brass section of the band received special recognition for excellence. Singled out for outstanding performances and thus receiving 1st place trophies for indoor competition were the swing flags receiving an excellent rating, the flag squad with an excellent rating, and the rifle squad known as

At the culmination of the festival, awards and trophies were received at a gala gathering of all students and adults from the 23 participating schools. Reporting for Public Safety, Councilwoman Swindlehurst read a letter of commendation from Chief Parenti to Captain George Germinder. The letter praised Captain Germinder's handling of a recent police action.
