### FAN. BOARD OF HEALTH TO CONDUCT BP/DIABETES SCREENING

The Fanwood Board of Health will conduct a free Blood Pressure/Diabetes Screening from 9:00-11:00 A.M., Saturday, June 8. The program will be held at the Fanwood Municipal Building, Multi-Purpose Room, 75 N. Martine Ave., Fanwood.

More than 23 million Americans have high blood pressure and many are unaware they have it. In most cases, high blood pressure is painless and produces no symptoms.

Individuals should be screened for high blood pressure if they:

- 1) Are 35 years of age or older
- 2) Are not under a physicians' care for high blood pressure
- 3) Have a family history of high blood pressure
- 4) Have not had a blood pressure test in over a year
- 5) Have stopped taking blood pressure medication without their physicians' approval

The early detection and treatment of high blood pressure can enable a person to lead a normal life. It takes only a few minutes to have your blood pressure checked.

## DECA Chapter triumphs in San Francisco competition

The Scotch Plains-Fanwood Chapter of the Distributive Education Clubs of America returned from their national competitions in San Francisco with national finalists in three areas of competitions. At DECA's national conference, over 6,000 high school students from 55 State Associations (including Washington, D.C., Puerto Rico, Guam, Virgin Islands and Canada) attended and each area of competitions had approximately 100 entries. From these entries, 12 national finalists were selected and received an Honorable Mention Award. SP-F's national winners included seniors Desiree' Olivito for her Finance & Credit Written event, Chapter President Frank Carvalho for his entry on Free Enterprise and Paul Mecca for his Civic Consciousness project. ## Elizabethtown Water Co. asks for customers help

Elizabethtown Water Company responded to Governor Kean's call for the prudent use of water throughout New Jersey. Chester Ring, 3rd, executive vice president, asked the Company's customers in the six counties it serves to join in a voluntary odd-even system of water use for lawn and garden care and in a series of other voluntary measures to insure that adequate amounts of water will be available to its customers and to parched northern areas of the State as well.

Ring stated that Elizabethtown's sources of supply are more than capable of meeting needs in the towns it serves. "But now," he explained, "the Company is being asked to supply substantial amounts of water to northern New Jersey. Demand rises dramatically during the period of lawn and garden watering. The Company's ability to service both its own and other areas may be impaired unless our customers help. Without voluntary conservation, such as odd-even sprinkling, the State Department of Environmental Protection may have to man-

date restrictions." Under the voluntary system, homeowners with odd street number may, if they wish, water lawns and gardens on odd days of the month, and those with even street numbers on even days of the month. "It should be stressed," said Ring, "that this means customers may sprinkle on those days, not that they should sprinkle." Ring also asked Elizabethtown customers to check all plumbing fixtures for leaks and to have these repaired as quickly as possible. He advised homeowners to water lawns in the early morning, when the sun's rays are least likely to cause evaporation. Lawn sprinklers, he added, should be carefully placed so as not to waste water on driveways, sidewalks and streets. Also, municipalities are being asked to limit the use of hydrants to Fire Protection purposes. "If we work together," said Ring, "we should be able to get through a difficult period without any real restrictions on water use. We'll have ample water for ourselves and our neighbors to the north."
