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ANNUAL SPRING CARNIVAL SET FOR 6/15 AT ASHBROOK NURSING HOME

Free entertainment for young and old will be a feature of the annual Spring Carnival set for Saturday, June 15 at Ashbrook Nursing Home in Scotch Plains. A popular community event, the carnival benefits the township's rescue squad.

Cuomo The Clown will be roaming the nursing home's grounds, at 1610 Raritan Road, to amuse visitors, as will a magician and accordionist. Additional music and entertainment will be provided inside Ashbrook.

There will be animal acts, a barbershop quartet, pony rides, a Ferris wheel, a whip ride and many games played for prizes.

Nursing home residents will be offering their craft work for sale. Baked goods will be sold by the Scotch Plains Woman's Club, Evening Membership Department.

Hot dogs, hamburgers, soft drinks, cotton candy, snow cones, popcorn, all will be available, with tables set up inside the nursing home's flowered courtyard.

The event begins at 11 a.m. with opening ceremonies by the South Plainfield R.O.T.C. Honor Guard and Scotch Plains Mayor Gabriel Spera.

Last year's carnival earned \$800 for the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad and the nursing home's goal now is to raise \$1,000 for the unit.

There will be lots of free parking at 1610 Raritan Road, at Terrill Road, until the carnival closes at 4 P.M. In case of rain, the event is postponed to Sunday, June 16th.

YMCA Rhythmic Gymnasts are National Champions

Fanwood-Scotch Plains YMCA announced that Class III Senior Division Rhythmic Gymnasts Lauren Post and Allison Kendrick won first and second over-all national awards at the National Compulsory Invitational Championships held in Livonia, Michigan.

Coach Suzanne Dixon commented, "I am overwhelmed that the girls did so well against a talented field. This is even more of an accomplishment because we are in our first year of competition. I am extremely proud of them and share their families' joy. These awards are proof of what a lot of hard work can produce."

Lauren swept the meet garnering all four first place honors. She won the free floor exercise, ball, rope and ribbon events plus first all-around. Lauren also earned the highest score of the meet.

Allison, the youngest competitor in her divi-

sion, took second in free floor exercise, second in ball, third in ribbon and sixth in rope. Her performance earned her over-all second place.

These girls joined a field of 137 competitors, all USGF members who came from all over the USA, including Virginia, New York, Florida and New Hampshire.

The Fanwood-Scotch Plains YMCA rhythmic program began in 1984 with a few experimental classes. This year it has expanded to a full age-group developmental program culminating in a class III team competing in USGF sanctioned meets. Under the direction of their coach and instructor, Suzanne Dixon, the girls learn

basic dance skills and manipulation of hand-held apparatus, ball, rope, hoop, ribbon and clubs. This is all combined into choreographed routines put to music.

Ordinance passes to apply for recycling \$'s

The Scotch Plains Council's adoption of an ordinance authorizing an interlocal services agreement with Fanwood was "a step that must be taken", according to Councilwoman Irene Schmidt, so that funding can be obtained from the state for recycling purposes. Execution of the contract was approved during Tuesday night's public meeting in Scotch Plains' municipal building.

Property owners on Dona Lane were notified of this meeting as it included the final reading of an ordinance regarding sanitary and sewer installation on that road. On its' adoption, \$16,000 was appropriated from the Capital Improvement Fund to finance the project.

Among other business, the contract for reconstruction of

Park Place was awarded to Al Sanguilliano, Inc. of Scotch Plains. The Park Place project is being funded by community development money from H.U.D. and work may begin as early as July 1.

A salary ordinance carried authorizing the signing of a labor contract with the Scotch Plains Public Works and Recreation Association. Township Manager Tom Atkins explained that collective bargaining had begun in late 1984 and that "employees are getting a fair agreement from Council." He noted the work of Public Works Director Ray D'Amato and Recreation Director Laura Sanson in putting together this contract.

Atkins made special mention of a letter received by his office from Terry Riegel, principal of Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School.

In the letter, Riegel commended the police department for its cooperation in receiving approximately \$51,000 from throughout the school year and particularly noted his appreciation for the department's maintenance needs, addition of juvenile police officer Carl Sicola.

Finally, a resolution of Richard Thomas was read amending the 1985 budget to allow for the anticipation of services.
