School's Open-Drive Carefully campaign launched by AAA

"September may not be the beginning of the calendar year, but it is the beginning of a new school year and an appropriate time for motorists to make resolutions regarding their driving habits," advises Matthew J. Derham, President of the AAA New Jersey Automobile Club, in announcing the 1985 "School's Open -- Drive Carefully" campaign.

Supporting the American Automobile Association's annual effort to promote conscientious driving as the summertime ends, Derham quoted the latest available statistics, and revealed that over 1,500 child pedestrians under 15 years of age were killed in motor vehicle accidents during 1983. "Thousands more children were injured, some seriously," the AAA spokesman pointed out. "Traffic accidents are always a tragic occurrence, especially when

children are involved." He urged motorists to be particularly alert in areas designated by school zone and school crossing signs, and routes normally used by children.

Almost one and a half million pieces conveying the "School's Open -- Drive Carefully" message are distributed nationally by AAA clubs. The New Jersey Automobile Club in its area effort is distributing safety posters and bumper stickers to 85 municipal police departments. In addition, "Otto the Auto" safety stories and teacher's guides are being distributed to elementary and junior high schools in Union County. The Club also assists school officials, parents and police in utilizing the AAA "Safest Route to School" project to help children develop safe walking habits.

Derham said that schools, parents, police and safety patrols can and

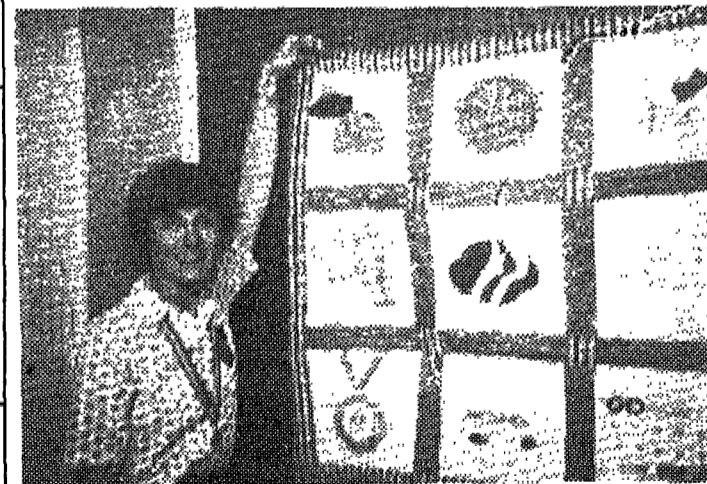

do play a large part in the traffic safety education of youngsters. "Children, returning to school, and particularly those enrolling for the first time, need help in understanding, remembering and following the safety rules of their school and community. Self-reliance in traffic situations is the key," he explained. Through the AAA-sponsored school safety patrols, Derham believes that children are provided with a positive lead to follow within the im-
