Area residents will have an opportunity to donate blood at any one of two drives held during the second half of September. All drives are cosponsored by the Plainfield chapter of the American Red Cross and New Jersey Blood Services and are open to the public.

On Monday, September 16, the Fanwood Presbyterian Church will host a drive from 3 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the church located at 74 South Martine Avenue in Fanwood.

On Wednesday, September 18, the Evangel Church, located at 1251 Terrill Road in Scotch Plains, will host a drive from 4 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Joseph Perfilio sworn in as S.P. Municipal Court Judge

Topping the agenda at Tuesday night's Scotch Plains Council meeting was the swearing in of Joseph Perfilio as Municipal Court Judge. Superior Court Judge Jim Walsh, a former Scotch Plains judge, performed the ceremony with Perfilio's wife, Lynn, and family members in attendance. Promising to "deliver justice to all fairly", Perfilio thanked Council members for selecting him for the position.

Councilwoman Irene Schmidt reported on the leaf disposal problem facing Scotch Plains this year. As liaison to the Solid Waste Advisory Committee, she stated that in previous years the township used the Martine Avenue extension site for temporary disposal. After neighbors complained, the Dept. of Environmental Protection closed this site and since the township has no other site of comparable size, the S.W.A.C. has been reviewing all available options. Public Works Director Ray D'Amato

has offered a possible solution that would involve county cooperation. Councilwoman Schmidt also stated that the Recycling Committee has not received a great deal of support from service groups offering to

volunteer at the Recycling Center. She reminded those present that the \$16,000 state grant given to organize the Center was contingent on obtaining assistance by service groups.

Councilwoman Pamela Boright, liaison to the Senior Citizen Advisory Board, stated that the Board will be touring facilities for senior citizens

in surrounding towns this month to familiarize themselves with various housing situations. The subject of housing was raised by the recent senior citizen survey as was the problem of transportation. A result of this last concern is that Scotch Plains' seniors will be getting a new bus. As October has been declared "CPR Awareness Month" by the Health Advisory Board, the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad will be conducting one hour "Awareness" presentations. Organizations are being offered this program as a public service. Please turn to page 5

Brochures have been mailed to all area residents, and heavy mail registration is on-going at this time. Interested persons are encouraged to make their course choices now because enrollments are limited. They may also sign up by coming in-person to the Adult School Office at the Administrative Offices of the school district, Evergreen Avenue and Cedar Street, Scotch Plains, any weekday afternoon between 1 and 4 p.m. In addition, in-person registration evenings will occur between 7 and 9 p.m. next Tuesday and Wednesday, September 17 and 18, in the High School lobby.

Other new courses include a Color Photography Workshop, sequel to Mel Schnur's popular introductory class last term; a seminar on How To Patent Your Invention & Market It; instruction on Getting Your Household Organized, Choosing the Proper House Color, and Developing Organizational Skills in Children. For young people there is a class on Babysitting Tips given by Martha Berghahn of the American Red Cross and a free information evening for those considering taking a

prep course. Workshops on dealing with weight problems, coping with depression, handling remarriage and "blender" families, and defeating perfectionism will be given too.
