Fanwood scientist explores Lake Superior in mini-sub

Christopher R. Paola, son of Mary B. and Nicholas J. Paola, of Fanwood, was one of 27 scientists who participated in the exploration of Lake Superior by the mini-submarine Johnson-Sea Link II, a 22-foot submersible operated off the parent ships, the Seward Johnson. The scientists are studying lake chemistry, sedimentary processes, fisheries and shipwrecks.

It is hoped that the information gathered during August including knowledge of the lake's circulation patterns will help policy makers decide how best to dispose of waste materials produced around Lake Superior and reduce pollutants carried

to the lake by air masses from as far away as Mexico.

Christopher Paola, assistant professor of geology and geophysics, at the University of Minnesota, will study the furrows created on the lake bottom by currents. These ribbon-like strands lie tens to hundreds of meters apart and affect the movements of nutrients, sediments and contaminants. Once it is understood exactly how there are created, they could be used as natural measures of the strength of the bottom currents in various areas of the lake. These same patterns are found in the oceans and understanding their origin Please turn to page 12

The Scotch Plains Health Advisory Board has declared October as "C.P.R. Awareness Month". In conjunction with this declaration, the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad will be conducting two (2), 1-hour "Awareness" programs available to all residents on: Wednesday, October 25th, 7:30 p.m., Green Forest Park Towne House, (Off Westfield Road) and Friday, October 29th, 7:30 p.m., Scotch Plains Library, 1927 Bartle Avenue.

"C.P.R. Awareness" should not be confused with actual C.P.R. (Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation). The purpose of the "Awareness" program is to educate residents as to the preliminary signs of a heart attack as well as recognize a heart attack taking place. C.P.R. Awareness stressed the actions that should be taken prior to actual C.P.R. being available and administered.
