Fan. sailor explores life aboard the USS Mississippi

It's 0700 aboard the other navigational USS Mississippi -- an award-winning guided missile cruiser based in Norfolk, Va. Crewmen, clad in blue dungaree uniforms and khakis, assemble with their divisions for morning muster.

One of those crewmen is Quartermaster 2nd Class Larry Fahey, the 23-year-old son of James and Barbara Fahey of Fanwood.

0750: "Turn To Commence Ship's Work!" blares the ship's loudspeaker. So begins another day for Fahey and his 530 shipmates who keep their ship ready to defend and protect the United States.

Fahey, a 1979 Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School graduate, works in the ship's Navigation Division where he keeps the 585-foot vessel on safe, accurate courses -- using nautical charts, compasses, satellites and

other navigational devices.

"I love my job," says Fahey, the leading petty officer in his division. "I actually like being underway more than being in port because it's peaceful at sea."

"I have a favorite spot on the bridge wing where I sit back on a nice, clear night to see the stars and watch the waves roll in."

Recently, the New Jersey sailor returned to Norfolk from a 7-month deployment in the North Atlantic and Mediterranean Sea. Port visits were made in Greece, Italy, France, Spain, England, Norway and West Germany.

"I did more sightseeing and exploring on this cruise compared to the last one," he says. "Norway was nice because I went skiing. It was beautiful. There were six people on one mountain. I also had



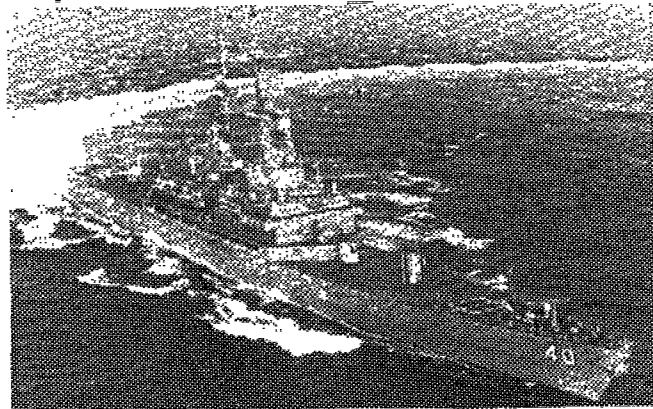

Oldest S.P. resident dies at age 100

Dominick Zazzali Sr., 100, Scotch Plains, the township's oldest resident, died Tuesday October 15 at home.

Born in Paris, he came to this country in 1895 and settled in Newark. He lived there most of his life and came here in 1980.

He was the co-owner, with his late father, Bartholomew Zazzali, of B-Zazzali and Sons of Newark, a wholesale banana dealer, and retired in 1960 after 65 years with the company.

Mr. Zazzali was a member of the Hall of Fame of the Essex Bowling League, a member of the Newark and Irvington Elks Bowling League, 300, and a member of the National Turners Athletic Club of Newark.

He was a communicant of St. Bartholomew the Apostle Church here.

His wife, Catherine

Boglioni Zazzali, died in 1965.

Surviving are a daughter, Rose Keggan of Cranford; three sons, Bart of Verona, Victor of Scotch Plains and Dominick Jr. of Mountainside; two brothers, Peter of Ohio and Louis of Toms River; two sisters, Cholitza Zazzali of North Plainfield and Theresa Marianelli of Newark; six grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted on Friday, October 18 at 8:15 a.m. from the Rossi Funeral Home, 1937 Westfield Ave., Scotch Plains. Mass of Christian burial at St. Bartholomew The Apostle Church at 9:30 a.m. Interment, Gate of Heaven Cemetery, East Hanover Visitation Thursday 2-4 and 7-9.
