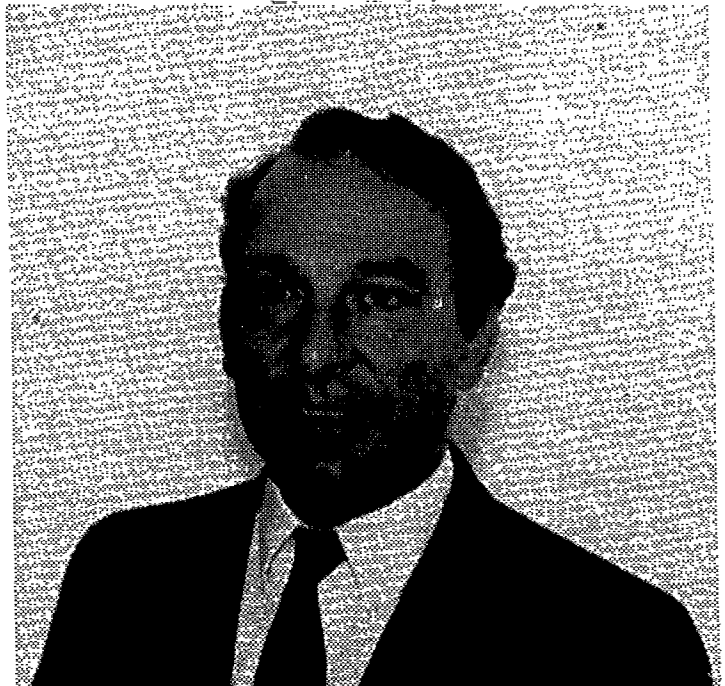
Coronella was elected this past November to fill the remaining term of Councilwoman Jan Scala who resigned from the Council for medical reasons.

A resident of Fanwood, Charlie and his wife, Shelia, live at 205 Pater-son Road with their four children. He is Vice President of Chase Manhattan Bank and holds a B.A. degree from Boston Col-

lege and an M.B.A. from the University of Chicago.

Councilman Coronella has a lengthy history of community involvement in Fanwood including two prior three-year terms on the Borough Council. During that time he served as Council President and Chairman of the Administration and Finance Committee. Prior to that Council service, he was on the Fanwood Planning Board.

Since 1979, Coronella has been a member of the Fanwood-Scotch Plains YMCA Board of Directors, and served as President of that Board from 1982 through 1984. He is currently chairman of the New Jersey Association of YMCA's, and active with the Eastern Regional Association and the national YMCA.

Work force completes 1st sweep of Township's leaves

Scotch Plains Township Manager Thomas Atkins has announced that the Township Department of Public Property work force completed their first swing of leaf removal of every street in the Township on Saturday, December 14. The Department of Public Property began to do streets for the second time this week.

The first swing through the Township for the curbside pickup took exactly four weeks. On November 16 the Township started the leaf pick-up program, which was about two weeks later than normal, when Union County Superior Court Assignment Judge Edward Beglin signed an order giving the Township permission to use its two temporary leaf transfer stations to store leaves during the annual leaf pick-up program.

Director of Public Property Ray D'Amato advised Atkins that it may only take ten working days to go through the Township the second time to pick up leaves because 75% to 80% of the leaves were on the street during the first swing through the municipality. The second trip through the Township streets will go much faster, barring any heavy snow emergency. D'Amato estimated that perhaps three-fourths of the streets in the Township will be finished for the second

time before Christmas Day.

Atkins and D'Amato thanked the residents for their patience and cooperation this year. Many homeowners were aware of the problems that the Township faced during the leaf pick-up because the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection would not permit the Township to use the temporary sites for leaf storage. The Township Council took the Department of Environmental Protection to court on November 15 when there was no solution to the leaf problem, and Judge Beglin signed his order that day that prevented the D.E.P. from taking any enforcement action against the Township for using the sites. The Township is going through the D.E.P. permit process now to seek any formal State approval that might be necessary to use the two locations in the future. The Township Council is already considering alternatives now to avoid the same situation in 1986. If formal D.E.P. approval is given to use the sites within the next few months, the municipality will at least be able to start the leaf pick-up in very late October or early November next year as it had done prior to 1985.
