S.P. joins communities in opposing Route 22 expansion

On June 4th, mayors and their representatives whose municipalities would be affected by a New Jersey Department of Transportation feasibility study along Route 22, met at the Scotch Plains Municipal Building at the invitation of Scotch Plains Mayor Joan Papen.

The Department of Transportation had engaged the firm of Andrews & Clark, Inc. to prepare a feasibility study and conceptual design of alternate improvements along the Route 22 corridor from Green Brook to Newark.

Those in attendance were: Joan Papen, Mayor-Scotch Plains; J. George Kadesh, Mayor-Green Brook; Bart Barre, Councilman-Mountainside; Marilyn Hart, Councilwoman-Mountainside; Adam W. Samiec, Engineer-Hillside; Tom Atkins, Manager-Scotch Plains; Maureen Ogden, Assemblywoman-22nd District; Bob Franks, Assemblyman-22 District; Fran Smith, Legislative Director to Assemblyman Franks.

The members attending were opposed to any plans to widen this corridor to six lanes. However, they felt the feasibility study should continue for the sole purpose of identifying and correcting safety problems along the route. This would include traffic signal improvements, possible new overpasses, or in hazardous areas improved ingress and egress to Route 22.

The members felt their municipalities should be

allowed input including recommendations during the planning stages of this study not after the study is completed. State Senator Donald DiFrancesco will be spearheading efforts to

afford the municipalities this opportunity. The Senator has been in contact both by phone and letter with Commissioner Hazel Gluck and D.O.T. officials.

Mayor Papen received a letter on June 4th from Commissioner Gluck in response to a Scotch Plains resolution opposing the widening of Please turn to page 15

Summer programs for youngsters & adults

Through Scotch Plains-Fanwood Community and Continuing Education, summer courses for young people and adults will commence June 30.

In its fourth season, the 1986 Creative Summer Workshops program will feature morning offerings again for students entering Kindergarten through Grade 12. New workshops include Creative Writing, Pattern Patches (quilting), Pen Points (calligraphy), a public speaking course, Rhythmics, and a word process/writing activity for children in grades 2

and 3. Familiar courses in dance, creative dramatics, foreign languages and foreign food cooking, SAT preparation, various computer experiences, driver education and training and piano will also be given.

Joint communities await opening of Recycling Center

As mandatory recycling looms over the horizon, the communities of Fanwood and Scotch Plains, the first two towns in Union County to combine forces, are busily preparing for the grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony at the new Recycling Center, North Avenue, Fanwood (near Quick Chek) on Saturday, June 21. Information regarding the site has been sent to residents and invitations have been sent to

many notables in Union County.

Three colors of glass, aluminum cans and newspapers will be collected at the center. The Jaycees, who have been recycling for more than 13 years at the Fanwood Train Station, will be moving to the new center and will man the site on opening day from 9 a.m. to 12 o'clock. The public is invited to bring their recyclables rain or shine.
