S.P. Council: Supreme Court acted illegally in decision

The Scotch Plains Township Council passed by an unanimous vote at their regular town council meeting a resolution that the New Jersey State Supreme Court acted illegally in its Mount Laurel II court decision. The resolution will be sent to

state officials in Trenton. A vote to amend the resolution by striking the word "illegally" failed by a 3-2 tally. Mayor Joan Papen, Councilman Gabriel Spera and Councilwoman Irene Schmidt voted against the amendment.

The council disagreed as

to whether proponents of the State Supreme Court decisions acted illegally due to legislative inaction. In other matters, the Council approved by a 3-1 margin to promote Mrs. Paulette Coronato to full membership on the Planning Board. Councilwoman Pamela Boright was the

lone dissenting vote.

At the meeting, Joseph Vogel, a candidate for Scotch Plains Council, assailed the promotion of Mrs. Coronato over Dr. R. Anne Jones, who he called "a true expert". Mayor Papen responded that Dr. Jones application

Concert Evening to launch Adult School

Scotch Plains-Fanwood Adult School will launch its Fall Term 1986 with a Community Concert Evening next Tuesday, September 16, 8 p.m. at the High School. Sabin Pautza, an internationally known composer who has conducted his own music at Carnegie Hall, and Corina Pautza, a professional vocalist who has sung all over the world, will perform piano and vocal pieces tracing musical history from classical to contemporary times.

The Pautzas are two of several new instructors who join the Adult School faculty this fall. The forthcoming term, which officially begins during the week of September 22, welcomes Joseph Tinervia of Fanwood, a former senior McGraw-Hill Book Company editor teaching Business Writing and

English as a Second Language students. Also new is Teresa Rodriguez, Assistant Registrar at the Newark Museum who will present Chinese Landscape Painting and Japanese Ink Painting. Walter Darian, a professional dancer and teacher of dance for 31 years, will travel from his native Brooklyn, New York, to instruct tap and ballroom dancing courses. Gillian Sloane, educated in cookery in her native England, will give classes on Fancy Hors d'Oeuvres, Fancy Desserts, and Cake Decorating. Professional artist Lisa Rabke will lead a Visual Arts Workshop for painting something other than canvas; and Meryl Nadell, a family therapist from Fanwood, will conduct three one-session programs on the

The R.N. staff of the Healthwise Wellness Center will provide courses in maternity fitness, motherhood education, and sibling preparation. Understanding the Deaf Community and Voice Training round out the list of 34 new Scotch Plains-Fanwood Adult School offerings.

The Watchung Power Squadron returns this fall to give its popular Boating, Sail and Power course; and the school's extensive computer curriculum will be part again of the total semester program. Other favorites coming back are Hot Air Ballooning, Calligraphy with new instructor Tisha Bender, Weichert's Real Estate Licensing, Wood-
