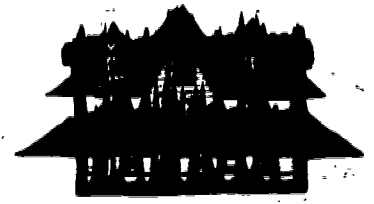

Resnick visits White House

Life in our nation's capital has returned to normal for Steven Resnick, the Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School graduate who toured the White House on January 21 with President and Mrs. George Bush.

Steven Resnick, son of Lawrence and Eileen Resnick of Greensview Lane, Scotch Plains, attends George Washington University in Washington, D.C. The 19-year-old sophomore is a business major and lives about three blocks from the White House.

After watching the inauguration and the parade on Friday afternoon, January 20, Resnick and other G.W.U. students camped outside the White House gates all night when they heard about a tour of the new President's home scheduled for Saturday morning. Their 12-hour wait in below-freezing weather paid off.

Shortly after 7 a.m. the East Gate of the grounds was opened for the White House American Welcome. Steven Resnick and his fellow G.W.U. students were the first visitors admitted. As a result, they were among the group of only 15 peo-

ple to be escorted through the White House by President Bush with his wife, Barbara, and a curator.

When reached by telephone at his dormitory a few nights ago, Steven Resnick admitted not remembering much about the White House.

"I was so nervous," he said, that he spent most of

the 40 minutes staring at the President and First Lady.

Steven's lucky tour brought him some instant celebrity. He and his friends were included in the Associated Press's account of the open house and stories about him ran in the Star-Ledger, the Courier-News, and other

daily newspapers.

But Steven Resnick, who had worked "behind the scenes" at Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School as president of the stage crew and TV crew, seemed pleased that the notoriety is waning. He has returned to his normal sleeping pattern after his
