### FREE LEAF MULCH TO SCOTCH PLAINS RESIDENTS

The composting of leaves has been completed for this year and the mulch that was created is already being delivered FREE to all Scotch Plains residents.

The mulch is great for ground cover around your house shrubs and flowers. Put on 3" to 4" thick it keeps the weeds from growing and replenishes the soil because the mulch is rich in nitrogen. It is also good as a top dressing on the lawns, a light coating of an inch or less will grow grass beautifully. In the vegetable garden it will enrich the soil and help the vegetables grow. If you put it on heavy (3" to 4") between the rows and around the plants it will also keep the weeds down and turned over the next year will make your soil richer and softer to turn. Remember - this is an all natural process. We only add a little nitrogen to speed up the process. We are delivering it in 3 cubic yard or 5 cubic yard loads. If you want some please call 322-6700 ext. 243 or 244. Please be patient, the demand is great and work force small but usually you will have it within a few days.

## Camping mishap claims lives of S.P. mother and son

What began as an enjoyable week of camping at High Point State Park ended tragically for a mother and son from Scotch Plains.

Phyllis Burke and her young son Ian were found by a Park Ranger at approximately 1:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 11, apparent victims of suffocation. Charcoal was burning in a habachi grill inside their tent and State Police believe they were overcome by toxic fumes, however, tests are being performed to determine cause of death.

The loss of Ian and Phyllis, and the heartache of their family, is felt throughout the community.

Eight year-old Ian was a student at J.A. Coles Elementary School. Principal Carl Kumpf remembers him as "a spontaneous, friendly child, that was always smiling". Kumpf said, "The children were saddened by the untimely death of Ian." He said the children were given time to show their feelings and concern, and most are handling it well. Child study team members are available for youngsters

needing additional support.

In honor of Ian, a scholarship fund is planned to assist a graduating senior at SPFHS for conti-

ning education. Donations for the fund will be coordinated through J.A. Coles School PTA and can be sent to the Coles School, Kevin Road,
