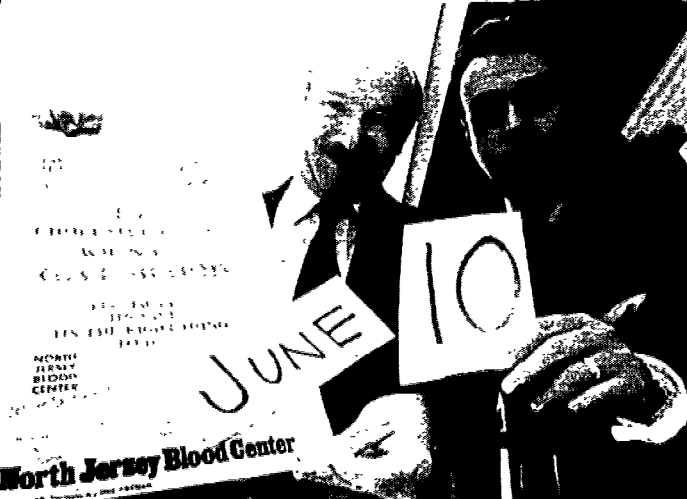

Primary Election Results

Primary election results in Scotch Plains and Fanwood yielded a slightly different outcome than the statewide tally for gubernatorial candidates. Chuck Hardwick was the number one Republican in both towns, receiving 947 votes in Scotch Plains and 226 votes in Fanwood. Jim Courter, now the Republican party's candidate for governor, placed third in Scotch Plains with 301 votes and second in Fanwood with 135 votes. Carey Edwards earned 317 Scotch Plains votes and 112 votes from Fanwood residents.

It was clear that both towns supported Jim Florio as the Democratic candidate for Governor. Florio received 505 votes

in Scotch Plains and 226 votes in Fanwood.

Scotch Plains Mayor Joan Papen earned 1483 votes as one of three Republican candidates for the three year term of Union County Freeholder. Papen, along with Republicans Paul O'Keefe and Mattie J. Halloway will run against Democrats Walter McLeod, Casimir Kowalczyk and Elmer Ertl for the Union County County Freeholders seats this November.

Fanwood Republicans did not have nominees on the ballot for the two available town council seats, so there were quite a few write-ins. William Winey and Joel Whittaker received the majority of write-in votes and will

represent the Republican Party this November. Mary Ann Connelly and John Ras, who ran un-

contested, are the Democratic candidates for this year's election.

Students raise \$2,000 for family of taxi driver



In their two-week effort, members of the Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School's Student Government Association have thus far raised approximately \$2000. for the family of Harish Kakar, the New York City taxicab driver killed in Scotch Plains May 11. The students have solicited funds from local PTA's, civic organizations, and businesses.

Leading the SGA endeavor are officers of the organization, including the five young people pictured above left to right. They are Jennifer Sanguiliano, president of the organization; Ali Buckley, president of activities; Craig Barcellona, commissioner of finance; Jennifer Stein, president of public relations; and Aimee Newman, commissioner of human relations. Also helping to direct the fund drive are SGA president of information Chris Kresge and commissioner of legislation Andrea Prato.

Cable upgrade starts in S.P. and Fan.

Suburban Cablevision of East Orange has begun construction on an upgrade of its cable equipment in Scotch Plains and Fanwood, and construction crews are currently working on cable lines throughout the communities.

During the next six months, Scotch Plains and Fanwood residents will see vehicles of Suburban's contractor, B & D CATV Contractors, in the area. To minimize interruption of subscribers' service, much of the work will be completed between 12 midnight and 6 a.m. with some interruption of service expected during the day. Suburban Cablevision employees will leave literature on residents' doors when crews are working in their neighborhood.

According to Frank DeJoy, vice president and general manager of Suburban Cablevision, "We feel this major undertaking is essential in order to meet the future cable-related needs and interests of our subscribers."

Suburban Cablevision currently offers 40 cable television channels to its subscribers throughout Essex, Hudson, Middlesex and Union counties. The

upgrade, scheduled for completion in 1990, will increase the system's capacity to 54 channels.
