### NO RECYCLING PICK-UP ON THE FOURTH OF JULY

The Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) has announced that there will be no curbside pick-up of recyclables in Scotch Plains, Tuesday, July 4, due to the Independence Day Holiday. Residents living on the north side should hold their recyclables until the next scheduled pick-up on Tuesday, July 18.

Recyclables will be collected on the south side on Wednesday, July 5.

The UCUA's regional recycling program collects tied bundles of newspapers, glass bottles and jars and aluminum beverage cans at curbside every other week, except for holidays. Recyclables should be placed at the curb no later than 7:30 a.m.

## Council & builder come to compromise over historic home

The Scotch Plains Town Council adopted an ordinance Tuesday which would rezone a lot on Mountain Ave. in an attempt to save an historic home on that lot. The step was taken as part of a compromise with a builder who now owns the lot and has future plans to develop on it.

When Anthony Doyle bought the former McBride property he had plans to demolish the existing home and apply to the Planning Commission for permission to subdivide and build four new homes on the lot. When the Scotch Plains Historical Committee notified Mr. Doyle of the historical value of the home, he agreed not to tear it down but to have

the lot rezoned so that he may apply to subdivide and build two more homes on the property.

Residents who spoke out at the meeting were opposed to any rezoning which would enable Mr. Doyle to build more houses on that property, fearing an overcrowding in their neighborhood.

Mayor Joan Papen stressed the fact that rezoning the land does not give Mr. Doyle permission to build and that any proposed building would have to be approved by the Planning Committee. She stated that "Our main objective is to preserve that house" and that this compromise is a step toward doing so.

Anthony Doyle, who attended the meeting with his lawyer, Barry Hoff-

man, expressed an interest in saving the home, but would also like to develop other portions of the property. Mr. Hoffman pointed out that Mr. Doyle was under no obligation to save the home but he chose to do so after learning of its historic value. Mr. Doyle can not prohibit the demolition of the building once the lot is sold to a new owner, but the Township is working to create an Historical Commission, which could get the house placed on the Registry of Historic Homes, preserving it in later years.

Other ordinances adopted included plans to reconstruct portions of William and Warren
