Union Catholic High School receives recycling award

The State of New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and Energy presented an award for "Outstanding Achievement in Recycling" to Union Catholic Regional High School in Scotch Plains, for its recycling program. Local and state officials cited the program as a

"model" for other schools, and it is recognized as having "instilled outstanding spirit for conservation and recycling in every student and staff member."

At Union Catholic, recycling became so successful because of "top down" recycling leadership. Sr. Percylee Hart, Principal of Union Catholic and Sr. Mary Raymond, Science Chairperson learned all they could about collection and preparation of materials. The school purchased special bins to carry a uniform message, a student Environmental Club was formed and ongoing communication with the township provided for convenient removal and marketing. The result was a rapid increase in the recycling of high grade white paper, colored paper, computer printout, corrugated cardboard, other mixed paper waste and aluminum cans.

Disposal costs were reduced from \$37,058. in the 1989-90 school year to \$13,972. at the end of the 1990-91 school year. The school was nominated to receive the award by the Scotch Plains Recycling Coordinator, Sharon Pachler.

In addition to the State Award, the school has been commended by the Union County Recycling Coordinator, Joan Pachler. Please turn to page 15

Former mayor "cleared" of unspecified charges

Almost six months after retiring from public office, former Fanwood Mayor Patricia Kuran has received a letter from the N.J. Dept. of Community Affairs advising her of a complaint filed against her under the Local Government Ethics Law. The letter, addressed to Kuran as "Mayor, Borough of Fanwood", states that the complaint was filed October 28, 1991 and concerned her "policy position on the issue of affordable housing." However, the letter continues, "The Board has deemed the complaint frivolous, and has dismissed it."

New Jersey's Local Government Ethics Law requires that the official or employee who is the target of an investigation need only be notified about the complaint at the conclusion of the in-

vestigation. The letter does not specify the complaint or name the com-

Paula Leighton

Wife, mother and artist... a person who loved life

Paula Trubek Leighton, 53, of Plainfield, died on Wednesday, May 27, 1992 at her residence.

She was born in Hackensack and lived in Montclair and Summit before moving to Plainfield in 1981.

Mrs. Leighton graduated from the Putney School in Vermont and attended the University of Wisconsin and studied at the Art Institute of Chicago.

She served on the boards of Peter's Valley Craftmen, New Jersey Designer Craftmen,

Suburban Chamber of Commerce. She was past President of the Scotch Plains Chamber of Commerce and Executive Director of the American Craft Retailer's Association.

For the past 19 years, Mrs. Leighton was co-owner with her husband, Henri Leighton, of Beautiful Things in Scotch Plains.

In addition to her husband, Henri Leighton, Paula is survived by two sons, Kurt Gollhardt of Plainfield and Seth Gollhardt of Dallas, Pa., a

brother, David Trubek of Madison, Wisconsin and one granddaughter, Amber Gollhardt.
