On April 19th, at 7:00 am our DPW will begin spring leaf and gumball pick-up. All residents must have their leaves and gumballs curbside by this date because we are planning only one pick-up cycle which takes about five days.

We are requesting everyone's cooperation with removing all rocks, stones, branches and any other foreign material from the piles. The foreign material can create serious damage to our equipment resulting in pick-up delays.

Immediately after the pick-up, we will be sweeping the entire Township. In order to perform a thorough job, and make our roads cleaner, we are asking everyone to keep vehicles off the street from 7:00 am to 3:00 pm during pick-up, as well as during our sweeping operation.

Due to very bad weather this year, the Township has made the decision to change the date of the pick-up to April 19th instead of the first week in April. This will give all our residents ample opportunity to clean their yards.

Again, we are asking all our residents for the usual cooperation to enable us to do a thorough job with the clean up.

Scotch Plains P.B.A. Local #87 will honor Captain John Trembicki and Patrolman Edward Blake at a retirement dinner on Friday, May 14, 1993 at the Shackamaxon Country Club, Shackamaxon Drive, Scotch Plains, New Jersey.

Captain Trembicki, who retired on February 28, 1993, was attracted to police work because he wanted to work outdoors and found helping people a rewarding job.

The 42-year veteran spent 1946 to 1947 in the Army Air Corps in Guam and worked for New Jersey Bell Telephone for several years before embarking on his law enforcement career.

During his early years on the force, the 65-year-old captain attended classes at Union County College and attained an associate's degree in criminal justice. He also graduated from Kean College with a bachelor's degree in public administration and political science. Capt. Trembicki

attended the Police Academy in Sea Girt in 1961 and F.B.I. officers' training courses in criminal investigation, photography and fingerprinting.

In 1958, Captain Trembicki served as president of P.B.A. Local 87 and has been a member of the Municipal Investigations Association.

The captain saved two lives during his career, thanks to the availability of oxygen in patrol cars. In one case he revived a premature infant who was just days old.

with their three daughters, Kathryn, Joanne and Christine.
